The High Weald is an AONB. Can you remember what AONB stands for?

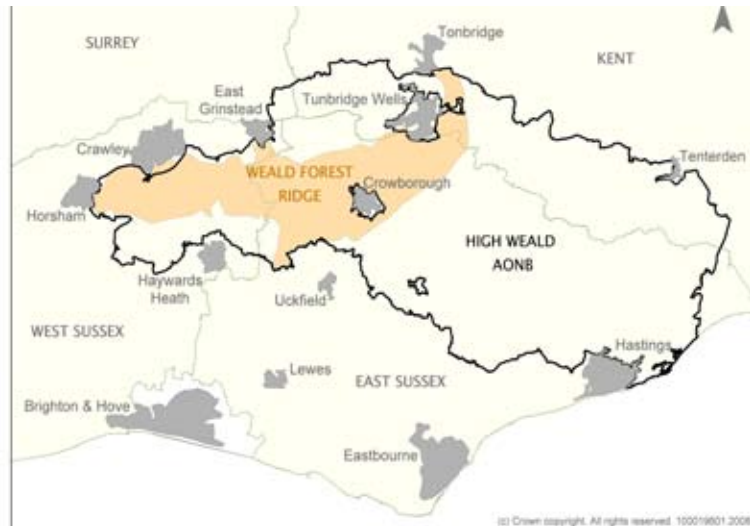
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Here is a map of the High Weald AONB.
